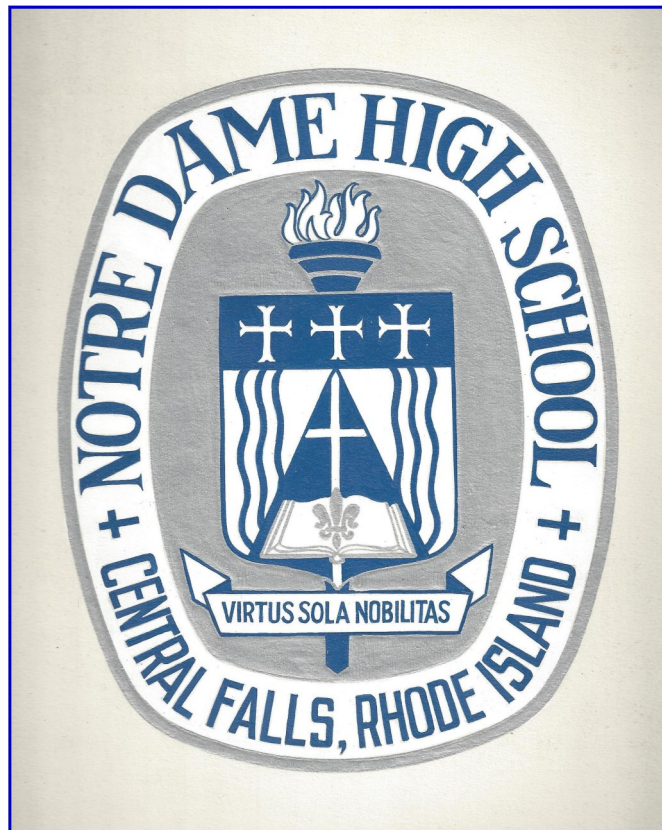

Timeline

- 1873 – Notre Dame Parish is formed by Father Charles Dauray, its first Pastor.
- 1875 – The first Notre Dame Church is built on Fales Street.
- 1883-1892 - Elementary school classes, grades 1 through 6, are taught in the basement of the church. The first educators are the Sisters of Mercy.
- 1891 – Father George Mahoney, the parish's third Pastor, purchases the Sprague Warehouse on the corner of Broad Street and Lincoln Avenue and renovates the building to use it as a school and convent.
- August 2, 1892 – Eight Sisters of Saint Anne arrive from Lachine, Quebec to begin their mission of teaching in the new school: Sister M. Praxede, Superior, Sr. M. Edouard, Sr. M. Irmine, Sr. M. Celestin, Sr. M. Colombe, Sr. M. Theodora, Sr. M. de la Passion, and Sr. M. Venance.
- September, 1892 - Notre Dame du Sacre Coeur Grammar School opens its doors in the former Sprague Building. Eventually grades 7 and 8 are added.
- January, 1893 – Fr. Mahoney invites the RI School Superintendent for an official visit to obtain (and receive) accreditation.
- February, 1894 – Fr. Joseph Beland becomes the fourth Pastor of Notre Dame du Sacré Coeur.
- 1899 – Fr. Beland purchases land next to Jenks Park and, for approximately nine years, two remodeled barns on this property serve as St. Anne School and house elementary school classes taught by the Sisters of Saint Anne. A house on the same property becomes their convent.
- 1900 – St. Joseph Gym is built on Fales Street on additional property acquired by Fr. Beland.
- 1909 – The cornerstone of the new Notre Dame School building, on the corner of Fales and Fletcher Streets, is dedicated. At the time its construction is completed, it is the largest Catholic school in the Diocese of Providence.
- September, 1910 – Notre Dame School is ready for classes.
- 1920 – A new convent with private bedrooms is built for the Sisters of Saint Anne.
- September, 1920 – A two-year commercial program (grades 9 and 10) is founded by Sr. M. Cleophas and Sr. M. Eugene de Jesus serves as the sole instructor.
- 1925 – The grotto to Our Lady of Lourdes is built when Sr. M. Cleophas served as Superior.

- 1927 – The cornerstone is laid for the new Notre Dame Church building on Broad Street.
- October, 1933 – The dedication ceremony is held to officially open the new Notre Dame Church.
- 1940 – A four-year commercial-classical high school for girls is created under the direction of Sr. M. Corona. A student body of 53 occupied four classes on the first floor and two on the second. A light blue uniform is adopted.
- June, 1943 – There are seven graduates in the first graduating class of NDHS.
- 1944 – NDHS makes its radio debut and wins first prize with a musical interpretation of “Twas The Night Before Christmas.”
- 1945 – The alumnae association is formed.
- 1943 - 1948 NDHS graduates publish a yearbook entitled “The Beacon.”
- 1948 – NDHS buys its first piece of sports equipment.
- 1949 – 1950 NDHS graduates publish a yearbook under a new name, “Memorare.”
- 1952 – Claire Quintal, Class of 1948 becomes the first lay teacher to serve on the faculty of NDHS.
- 1952 – Claire Villandré, Class of 1953, presents her prize-winning science exhibit at Oak Ridge, TN
- 1955 – The “Girl of the Year” award is first presented to Lorraine Bonvouloir. The annual award is later changed to “Miss Notre Dame.”
- 1957 – NDHS holds its first formal, an Emerald Ball.
- 1958 – For the first time, graduates are honored with an Awards Night.
- June, 1959 – The high school moves from the first floor to the third floor, the principal’s office is installed on the top landing, and a central library is established in the basement across from the newly-remodeled laboratory.
- 1962 – The Diocesan Honor Society is formed.
- 1963 – The Student Council is established by Sr. M. Bernadetta, the National Honor Society is formed, the public address system is installed by the Benevolent Society, the principal’s office is re-located to the second floor, a contest is sponsored for the design of a new school shield, and a new plaid uniform is adopted.
- 1964 – School rings appear with the new school shield.

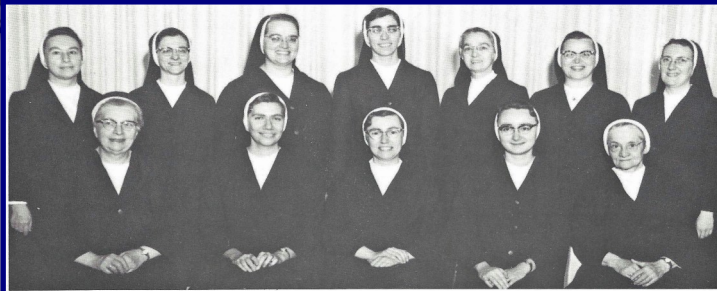
- 1965 – The Chorallettes is organized by Sr. M. Judith.
- 1966 – Students begin taking gym classes at the YWCA, the Sewing Department is re-located to the upstairs hall, Parent’s Night is initiated as an annual tradition, and Art becomes a regular course offering for students.

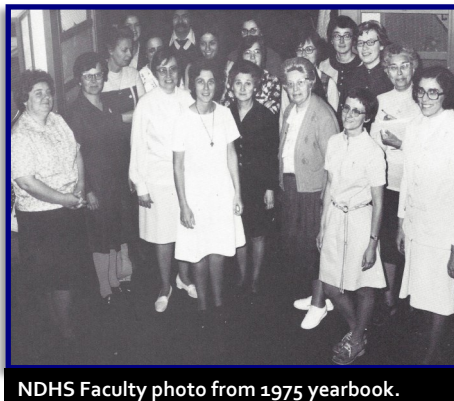

1969 NDHS Faculty with new veils.

- 1968 – Notre Dame High School celebrates its 25th anniversary, the annual Awards Night is replaced by an Awards Banquet and the Guidance Department is established.
- 1972 – Flexible Modular Scheduling is adopted.
- 1972 – After the death of Pastor Arthur Bienvenue in December, 1971, Notre Dame Parish is lead by a Team Ministry with Sr. Elaine Duquette, SSA as a stand- ing member. After her departure, a Sister of Saint Anne would always serve on the Team Ministry and/or the Parish Council. Sr. Marguerite St. Amand and Sr. Rita Deroy have served in such capacities.
- 1973 – St. Joseph Gym is razed.
- 1973 – Notre Dame Parish celebrates its centennial.
- 1973 – Sr. Anna Launier organizes the Notre Dame Senior Citizens Club.
- September, 1974 – Boys are admitted into NDHS for the first time as freshman.
- 1975 – Sr. Rhea Lachapelle is given the Distinguished Service Award by Bishop Gelineau and she is then honored by Mayor Garvey of Central Falls.
- June, 1977 – There are 43 graduates in the last graduating glass of NDHS.
- September, 1977 – A meeting is held to distribute Momentum 1977, the final yearbook of NDHS. On the same occasion, a brief ceremony is held during which nine former juniors of NDHS are given diplomas from Notre Dame High School as a result of their having completed courses during the summer at Community College of RI to obtain their necessary final high school credits.
- 1978 – Sr. Rhea Lachapelle initi- ates the RI Neighborhood Friendly Visitor Project.
- 1982 – Notre Dame School building becomes Chateau Anne, an apartment com- plex for thirty-nine elderly or handicapped residents.
- 1982-1983 – Sr. Simonne Daigneault serves as the convent's last coordinator.
- July 7, 1983 – Sr. Simonne Daigneault and Sr. Blanche Laurence are the last sisters to leave the convent after Fr. Leon Maynard prays with them in the chapel and then removes the Blessed Sacrament.

Memories of a Student Become Teacher

Summer was almost over and school would start on Wednesday. This year (1954) was different from previous ones. I was going into high school. All was ready. The white blouses were ironed and the light blue jumper was waiting on its hanger.

The big day came and off I went to Notre Dame High School. It was exciting to meet new classmates and find out where they had been in school before. Of course, it was only girls, since the boys all went to Sacred Heart Academy or some other neighboring high school. We met all our new teachers, all nuns except for one lay woman, Claire Quintal, who was to be our Latin teacher that year. We learned the routine of changing classes which had not happened in our previous school years. We had four different classes in the morning followed by a study period before lunch. During study, many girls participated in Choir and/or Glee Club. Most of us had our lunch in the school "cafeteria" which was a room in the old gym building. Some devoted ladies would prepare meals for those who chose not to bring a lunch. Classes resumed in the early afternoon following the recitation of the rosary. Dismissal came after the two afternoon class periods. Extra-curricular activities were always after school. The basketball team would share the gym with the cheerleading team.

The routine was pretty much the same from day to day and year to year. Various events punctuated different seasons, most notably the Glee Club performances each year. But

who could forget the rag collections to raise funds? There were closed retreats in Manville, special movies in the upstairs hall, bowling in the gym where you had to set up your own pins. Activities away from the school meant we had to find our own transportation.

Our teachers encouraged us as we struggled through the various subjects required for graduation. We left the school prepared for college or the business world. Upon graduating from the high school, I was excited to be done with one stage of my education but somewhat nervous about what was to come. I had applied for entrance into the Sisters of Saint Anne and had been accepted for entry on August 4 of that summer. I knew I would be leaving home forever and probably never see many of my classmates again. So I guess you can say that the feelings were bittersweet.

Ten years later, I was again looking forward to the first day of school at Notre Dame High. This time I was to be on the other side of the desk. My specific task was to teach math. When I was assigned to teach at Notre Dame High, I was both happy and scared. Until then, I had only taught on the elementary level and this meant entirely different class preparation and dealing with older students. At the same time, I was happy to go to a place familiar to me and with people that I knew.

Upon my arrival, I found that some things were still the same with many of the girls coming from neighboring schools and the schedule being very similar to what I had experienced as a student. In some ways, the girls were the same: friendly, fun-loving, ambitious, enthusiastic, and cooperative. However, life in the late sixties had become more complicated. There were more family problems, time commitments, social activities, and financial difficulties to contend with.

Other things had changed a lot. As a student, my classrooms were mostly on the first floor of the building, now the rooms were on the third floor. There were fewer sisters and more lay teachers. Many more of the students had to work after school which was not as prevalent when I was a student. There were lots more out-of-town students. We were now serving more parishes. Unfortunately, equipment had not changed an awful lot. However, I could not have gotten along without my overhead projector which did not exist in the 50's!

On the plus side, there were a lot more clubs and activities. I became involved in Math Club and sports activities. A physical education program was introduced using the facilities and the staff of the YWCA. Our girls had the opportunity to enjoy many sports and games that could not be done at the school. A new type of flexible schedule was developed for the school. Classes could last anywhere from 20 minutes to 80 minutes depending on the structure a teacher wanted. Study periods were not all at the same time. A week of mini courses was introduced. Winter vacations gave opportunities for ski trips to Canada. There was lots of activity, lots of work and lots of fun.

Innovation even allowed us to welcome boys into the high school. Adaption was the word that year. The experiment was successful. Unfortunately, the closing of the elementary school forced the high school to close also. All the students transferred to other local schools to complete their high school.
